About the Authors

Russell Sawchuk



Russell Sawchuk was raised on a farm near Arran, Saskatchewan. The farm was the homestead settled by his grandparents in 1908. For the first four years, he attended a small rural school

(Pasieka) with about 10 students. The school was eventually closed, and all the students were then bused to Arran School.

After graduating from high school, he attended the University of Saskatchewan where he received a BA Honours degree in Psychology. He stayed at Mohyla Institute where he met Sandy, his future and present wife. After graduation, he continued his education at Temple University in Philadelphia, Boston University (Masters in Communication Research) and University of Toronto (Diploma in Business.)

It was in Toronto that he found a passion for photography. After taking photography courses at Ryerson College and the Ontario College of Art, he purchased a photo studio on Yonge Street. (This was in addition to his regular job at Ontario Hydro).

In the late 1970s Russell and Sandy moved to Edmonton to be closer to their families. In Edmonton, he taught at Grant MacEwan College, and later worked at Access Alberta and Alberta Education. In 1989, Russell started his own technology consulting company – *Steppingstones Partnership Inc.* Most of his recent work has consisted of developing and hosting online education courses for the various health professions.

Eventually, both he and his family became involved with various Ukrainian communities and organizations in Edmonton. They became members of St. Anthony's Ukrainian Orthodox Parish in west Edmonton. Russell has developed and hosted websites for various Ukrainian organizations. These include St. Anthony's Parish, St. Stephen's Cemetery, Ukrainian Museum of Canada (Alberta Branch) and the Ukrainian Orthodox Western Eparchy office.

He began taking drone and regular photographs of historic churches in 2021. This became the *Pioneer Churches on the Prairies* project. It is an ongoing initiative to record, document and share information about the historic churches established by early settlers in north central Alberta.

The project objectives are to capture, record and preserve high-quality photographs and videos of these historic churches and their cemeteries. Another objective is to research, record and preserve available historical information about each parish and its cemetery.

He wants to share, promote and inform the general public and the descendants of these pioneers about these important historic churches. This is being done by his dedicated website – *Pioneerchurches.ca* – and exhibits of his photographs.

In 2021 Russell learned about the extensive historical research done by Jars Balan on the region's Ukrainian Orthodox churches. Slavco Demchinsky was able to provide images for the church interiors. They decided to collaborate to combine their photographs and histories into one document. This book is the result.

About the Authors

Jars Balan



Jaroslav “Jars Balan” was born and raised in Toronto. From an early age he took part in Ukrainian community organizations affiliated with the Ukrainian Orthodox Church at St. Volodymyr Cathedral

and St. Vladimir’s Institute. He first travelled to Ukraine as a seventeen-year-old in 1969 with fellow members of the Canadian Ukrainian Youth Association (CYMK).

In the early 1970s he took creative writing courses for three summers at the former Banff School of Fine Arts. In 1974 he spent three months hitch-hiking across Western Canada visiting pioneer-era Ukrainian settlements on a Canada Council grant. He subsequently co-wrote a half-hour musical inspired by the experience called “Song of Leaving.” It was successfully staged in 1976 at the Odessa Pavilion during Toronto’s Caravan Festival.

After obtaining an Honours B.A. from the University of Toronto in 1975, he moved to Edmonton. He completed an M.A. in English (Creative Writing) at the University of Alberta in 1981. During his student days he was involved in the Ukrainian Canadian Students’ Union (SUSK). He was especially active publishing the newspaper, *Student*, promoting multiculturalism and working in support of the dissident movement in the Soviet Union.

For seven summers beginning in the mid-1970s he was part of the leadership and a lecturer in Ukrainian literature at the Selo Cultural Immersion camps sponsored by CYMK. With the establishment of the Canadian Institute of Ukrainian Studies (CIUS) at the University of Alberta in 1976, Jars was

gradually drawn into the scholarly study of Ukrainian Canadian history and culture. He edited books, translated literature and organized conferences on Ukrainian Canadian themes. He is the author of a best-selling illustrated history, *Salt and Braided Bread: Ukrainian Life in Canada*, published in 1984 by Oxford University Press.

In 1988-1989 he taught several courses on Ukrainian history and civilization for the Ukrainian Studies Centre at Macquarie University in Sydney, Australia. In 1991-1992, he spearheaded the creation of the Kalyna Country Ecomuseum on the territory of Canada’s oldest and largest Ukrainian bloc settlement.

In 2000, he was asked to become the coordinator of the Ukrainian Canadian Program at CIUS. It was renamed the Kule Ukrainian Canadian Studies Centre in 2007.

Over the years he has written numerous articles on various aspects of the Ukrainian experience in Canada and overseen research on a wide range of topics. His work documenting the histories of Ukrainian Orthodox churches in Alberta began as a project initiated by the Western Eparchy to mark the 1991-1992 centennial of Ukrainian settlement in Canada. He continues to add to his extensive findings on the subject as new sources come to light. While detailed records are available for some congregations, there is a paucity of accurate information about others. Limited space also required that several accounts be edited for length.

Jars is married to Dr. Lesia Boychuk, whose parents, Rev. Wasyl Boychuk and Dobrodiika Olha (Maslo) Boychuk, immigrated to Canada in 1948 and served their first parishes in the Glendon district in 1949-1950.



About the Authors

Sterling (Slavco) Demchinsky



My ancestors immigrated to Canada during the earliest period of Ukrainian immigration. My great-grandparents were all born in either Galicia or Bukovyna in villages now in the western part of Ukraine. However, these places were then part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire.

My grandparents were born in a frontier land that was then called the Northwest Territories that eventually became the province of Saskatchewan. They grew up living in the typical two-room log houses with thatched roofs based on styles from the old country. When my grandparents married, they built a thatched-roof house for themselves, too. By the mid 1920s they could afford a real wood-frame house with a shingled roof. My family had gone from being Ukrainian peasants to being Canadian farmers.

I was born in the 1950s in Flin Flon, Manitoba. My parents both came from the vicinity of Canora, Saskatchewan. In the 1940s they separately moved to Flin Flon to find work in this mining boomtown. They struck up a relationship and were married in 1950.

The last of four children, I was baptized in St. Mary's Ukrainian Catholic Church in Flin Flon. I flirted with other religions, particularly with the Anglican Church. After considerable meditation, I concluded the Orthodox Church would be the best home for me because I was confident with it on many levels. For me, the Orthodox Church is totally complete.

Many Ukrainian parishes, both Catholic and Orthodox, have dwindled to the point that they may only have one service per year. Many more no longer have services at all. Of those Ukrainian parishes that still do have services regularly, many are facing the question of demographics. If the majority of parish members are over sixty-five years of age now, where will the parish be in ten or twenty years from now?

This brings me to one of the primary reasons that I photograph Ukrainian churches. So many churches are in danger of closing. They deserve to be documented as a symbol of our heritage and as a monument to our pioneer ancestors. Of course, when there are new vibrant Ukrainian churches in Canada, they deserve to be documented too – if for no other reason than that we need to see examples of success more than ever now.

Since 1995, my goal has been photographing every Ukrainian church in Canada. I have photographed over 650 of them. Now retired from my career with the Federal Government, I work as an independent writer and researcher, collaborating with Ukrainian churches, universities, etc. After retiring, I studied the theology of Eastern Rite iconography at St. Paul University in Ottawa. I consider myself to be an “amateur iconologist”.

My photos are housed in the National Archives, the Archives of the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchy of Winnipeg, and the Archives of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of Canada.

Working with small churches on the prairies has become my life's joy.
